RECOMMENDATION LETTERS

Pursuant to the terms of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), students may review letters of recommendation and accompanying forms <u>after they enroll at a postsecondary institution</u>, if that institution saves the documents post-enrollment. All college applications will ask students if they want to waive their FERPA rights.

Why would you waive your FERPA rights? Waiving your FERPA rights lets colleges know that you will never attempt to read your recommendations, which reassures colleges that your recommenders have been fully candid and truthful.

College Advising *strongly recommends* that you waive your right and while you are free to respond as you wish, if you choose not to waive your right, some recommenders may decline your request, or colleges may disregard letters submitted on your behalf.

Remember, even if you retain your right of access, you still won't be able to view any recommendations until after you have been admitted to and enrolled in a college.

In other words, FERPA does not allow you to inspect recommendations before they are sent to your colleges.
